

She positioned fifth on flooring exercise after she had a step out of bounds. At the 2020 Olympic Games, Saraiva injured her ankle on her final tumbling move on ground during qualifications, thus, performing solely on floor and balance beam. Saraiva ended the season competing on the Cottbus World Cup the place she positioned first on ground exercise and second on stability beam behind teammate Andrade. She finished fifth on ground exercise. Individually she placed fifth within the all-around, second on steadiness beam behind Riley McCusker of the United States, and was co-champion on flooring exercise alongside Abby Paulson of the United States. She placed first on steadiness beam, second along with her team and fifth in the all-around. Individually she received gold on balance beam and ground exercise. During skills Saraiva suffered an ankle harm on vault but nonetheless managed to qualify to the all-around ultimate in tenth place and the flooring exercise ultimate in first place. Despite the harm Saraiva competed on all 4 apparatuses, helping Brazil win the bronze medal behind the United States and Italy.

The next month she competed on the Brazilian Event Championships where she placed first on stability beam and second on floor exercise behind Fidelis. After a fall on balance beam within the all-around closing, she finished in 8th place. The following week she competed on the Osijek Challenge Cup the place she gained silver on flooring exercise behind compatriot Thais Fidelis, bronze on balance beam behind Fidelis and Anastasia Ilyankova of Russia, and positioned fourth on uneven bars. Saraiva began the year competing at the Antalya World Challenge Cup where she won silver on stability beam behind Sun Xinyi of China. She certified to the all-around, stability beam, and floor exercise finals, the place she medaled on all of them, winning silver within the all-around and on steadiness beam and gold on floor exercise. Individually, [MovesMethod official site](#) Saraiva finished fifteenth within the all-around ultimate and [visit MovesMethod](#) took the bronze medal in the floor [visit MovesMethod](#) final behind Simone Biles and Andrade. She received a silver [joint health with movessmethod](#) the Brazilian group and ones on flooring exercise and beam. [external frame](#)

Together the staff received bronze within the staff last. In the course of the crew last Saraiva solely competed on uneven bars and helped Brazil finish fourth as a crew. The following month she competed on the 2018 South American Games the place she helped Brazil win gold within the crew ultimate. At the Pan American Games, she took the bronze medal within the all-around behind Canada's Ellie Black and USA's Madison Desch. After the World Championships, [visit MovesMethod](#) Saraiva competed at the Pan American Games, where the Brazilian workforce once again took silver behind the United States. In August, she was selected for the workforce to compete at the 2018 Pan American Championships alongside Jade Barbosa, Rebeca Andrade, Thais Fidelis, and Lorrane Oliveira. Saraiva was named to the staff to signify Brazil at the 2024 Summer Olympics alongside Rebeca Andrade, Jade Barbosa, Lorrane Oliveira, and Julia Soares. In June Saraiva placed fourth on the Brazilian Championships, ending behind Daniele Hypólito, Jade Barbosa, and Thais Fidelis. In August, she was crowned Brazilian National Junior Champion and added a bronze on beam to her medal haul. There she had an impressive meet, as she positioned first in the all-around and on floor, second with the group and third on bars and beam.

She next competed at town of Jesolo Trophy the place she helped Brazil finish second as a team behind Italy. In December Saraiva competed on the 2013 Gymnasiade in her own country where she helped her crew win silver. In April, Saraiva competed at the town of Jesolo Trophy, where she helped Brazil win the silver medal behind Russia. Just a few days later she competed at the Swiss Cup in Zürich alongside Arthur Mariano where they placed sixth in skills. Saraiva competed at the World Championships alongside Andrade, Pedro, Soares, and Oliveira. The team took the silver medal behind the United States - Brazil's first workforce medal in World Championship history. 2016 Summer Olympics in Rio, the 2020 Summer Olympics in Tokyo, and the 2024 Summer Olympics in

Paris the place she won a bronze medal as part of the Brazilian team.
